OUR MISSION

The Bottom is a nonprofit cultural organization serving our community through our Black-affirming bookshop and arts programming. Rooted in place justice, we stand to build **community**, celebrate **culture**, and engage the **creativity** of Black people in Knoxville. We strive to cultivate a sense of belonging, togetherness and safety for Black people in Knoxville and beyond.

OUR STORY

Founded by Dr. Enkeshi El-Amin, a local sociologist studying race, place, and Black Communities, The Bottom was named after the first Black neighborhood in Knoxville that was demolished by urban renewal and institutionalized racism in the 1950s. El-Amin conducted interviews and archival research and found resounding feelings of displacement and loss of place amongst Knoxville's Black elders and youth. She wanted to do more than just conduct a study, she wanted to make an impact, and thus the idea of The Bottom began to take form.

Dr. El-Amin's efforts joined those of Brandi Augustus, Pumpkin Starr, and Ty Murray of Black Mama's Bail Out along with Jazmin Witherspoon and other Black women in Knoxville who also sought to do meaningful work. Today, The Bottom stands as a collective working to reclaim and reimagine Black space in Knoxville. What initially started with a youth sewing and entrepreneurial program in 2019, has grown into a hub of Black culture and togetherness. With the support of our community, our space has grown to include a tea room, podcast studio, expanded sewing studio, and bookstore. With the belief that Blackness is neither essentialist nor static. but relational, dynamic and changeable, The Bottom stands as a multi-use place to foster change and provide a sense of Black safety. The Bottom welcomes locals and newcomers to town.

2024 marks another year of innovation, expression, and connection at The Bottom. As I reflect on the sustained growth of our organization, and the incredible strides made in our arts department, this year has been nothing short of transformative. One of the standout milestones has been the successful conclusion of our inaugural season of Tiny Bookshop Concerts, a live performance series designed to highlight performers of color in an intimately empowering setting. 

In 2023 we held 76 events. We ended 2024 with 97 events, we continue to be amazed by the passion of our staff, partners, community members and volunteers who made this possible!




























































































































































































































The Sewing Circle

SEW IT SELL IT

A sewing and entrepreneurship program where participants have the opportunity to express their creativity, learn vocational skills and develop a sense of self-reliance by sewing and selling a product.

Through Sew It Sell It, students design a product and conceptualize a micro business around that product.

The program serves children between the ages of 12 and 17. No prior sewing skills are necessary and all equipment and supplies for the program are provided to students.

In addition to learning the basics of sewing, through a number of workshops led by business professionals and local entrepreneurs, community leaders and university faculty, students learn business and professional skills from branding and marketing, to giving a good pitch.

This year, our program also expanded its vocational offerings to include workshops on screen printing and pottery!

The goal of Sew It Sell It is to supplement youth in our communities with creative, practical and business management skills that they can continue to use on their own outside of the program.

Our 2024 Sew It Sell It summer program was made possible in part by funding received from the <u>Tennessee</u> <u>Arts Commission</u>.

BLACK CREATIVES MEETUP







Our Black Creatives Meetup (BCM) initiative is a longterm investment into Black artists and makers in our community.

As a year-round program, we continuously provide instruction, support and a safe space for our creative community to incubate and develop. BCM offers monthly workshops in addition to seasonal events. Each workshop centers an element of development, whether that be artistic, professional and/or social.

Through this initiative, we are listening and responding to creative voices. We asked Black artists what they need to thrive in our community and it came down to these three key points:

- Welcoming spaces to learn, gather and create
- More opportunities to meet and network with fellow artists
- Workshops, trainings & developmental opportunities

Through offering space, resources, and developmental programming for Black creatives, as well as supporting established Black artists and organizations, we invest in a historically underrepresented community, reinforcing our dedication to community investment and engagement in East Knoxville.

Our 2024 BCM program was made possible by funding received from the Tennessee Arts Commission.

COMMUNITY PODCAST STUDIO

The Community Podcast Studio at The Bottom is a community recording studio working to create accessible and affordable entry points for new audio makers (especially African Americans), and to activate an approachable DIY audio community in Knoxville. New forms of media and/or critical media platforms can be a powerful tool for empowerment work and work that otherwise challenges the dominant narratives.

The Community Podcast Studio at The Bottom is utilizes podcasting as a powerful form of media that introduces voices that are often silenced, engages new perspectives and experiences, and challenges misrepresentations of Appalachian identities in media.

We recognize that recording/production resources are often expensive and hard to find, but imperative for quality sounding audio. The podcast studio provides professional recording equipment for audio makers, as well as training that involves editing, interviewing, sound design and marketing.

Since its inception, the podcast studio has offered support to over 25 individuals and teams of audio makers through recording, training and community building.

COMMUNITY FELLOWSHIP







Since 2021, The Bottom has partnered with the University of Tennessee Knoxville's Division of Diversity and Engagement to offer a short term community fellowship.

We believe that the work of scholars and other professional staff can enrich civic and community life, and by pursuing such work in dialogue with the public, university research, teaching, and creative expression is elevated. In a semester-long fellowship, Black faculty/staff will serve as a resource and collaborator on a public facing, community identified or agreed upon project. The fellow will work directly with The Bottom's team to develop a project moving it from ideation to completion.

Our culminating round of fellows include: Dr. Robert Bland and Althea Murphy-Price.

Working with our Bookshop Director, Annastasia Williams, Dr. Robert Bland led a summer reading group for the book South to America: A Journey Below the Mason-Dixon to Understand the Soul of a Nation by Imani Perry.

Althea Murphy-Price will work closely with Ty Murray, our Director of Art and Communication on "Community Printmaking". This project seeks to establish a deliberate connection between printmaking and African American storytelling within our local community. The final project includes an artist talk and demonstration with the fellow, a community printmaking workshop, and establishing a multiuse printmaking station at The Bottom.

Working with scholars and professionals on projects that document and advance the local Black community.

CERAMICS AT THE BOTTOM

This project is an ongoing community workshop to develop and transmit ideas regarding ceramic culture and to help foster the next generation of Black Appalachian ceramic craft culture.

These ceramic arts-focused classes are broken into five different sessions where students gather once a week for three hours. Each session is six weeks long and takes place between August and May of each year. Over the course of its duration, this project provides experiential education the equivalent of an MFA course to a traditionally unsupported community.

The class explores the world of ceramic hand building and covers the following techniques:

- Pinch Pots
- · Coiling and Slab Building
- Hump Molds and Slump Molds
- Underglaze
- Slip Trailing
- Sgraffitto
- Inlay
- Monotype Transfers
- Glazing Styles

Classes are taught by Maggie Connolly and Jeremy Myles. This year, the project was supported n part by the Joseph F. Wall '41 Alumni Service Award, presented to four Grinnell College graduates, including Maggie Connolly, who are pushing for inclusivity, expanded knowledge.

YOUTH PROGRAM







Through the Lit Kidz program, we actively empower youth to make their own book selections in our space. We understand that giving youth the agency to choose literature that resonates with them encourages a deeper engagement with reading and promotes a lifelong interest in representative literature.

Additionally, we contracted local artists and authors to lead themed workshops centered around specific books. These workshops not only enriched our program but also fostered a strong connection between the community and our initiatives. By bringing in local creative professionals, we amplified the messages of the books, spread the joy of reading, and inspired the next generation of creatives.

Within our community and others like ours, limited access to diverse literature in public libraries and schools is extremely common as we encounter systemic book bans nationally. We are bridging the gap within our community, ensuring more children have access to quality, representative books.

Children's increased enthusiasm for reading and appreciation for diversity in book selections are notable. Additionally, we remove the financial barrier to accessing literature by keeping our program free. This allows families to feel comfortable coming into our space and selecting any book without worrying about the cost.

TINY BOOKSHOP CONCERT SERIES

The Tiny Bookshop Concert Series combines many facets of our organization and is a direct iteration of our mission: to build community, celebrate culture, and engage the creativity of Black people in Knoxville. This project pulls on the power that music has to connect, to heal and to spark change; bringing an engaging and generative cultural opportunity to East Knoxville.


This is a series of performances that are recorded live, with an emphasis on showcasing African American talent in an intimately empowering environment. Each show is built around a performer hailing from Knoxville, the state of Tennessee, or our larger southeastern region. The following is specially curated for each show: book selections from each performance are permanently archived and housed on our bookshop.org page, each show flyer is an original illustration of the performer's artistry, and the refreshment menu is also inspired by their taste palette.

In addition to compensating each performer for sharing their talent, the performers are also able to garner high quality recorded footage of their live performance, without the barrier of production cost. Support for this program includes: compensation for local and visiting musicians and artists to perform in East Knoxville, technical production support of both live performances and recorded documentations, fees for original graphics to be created by local artists/designers, and the cost of promotional and advertising needs.

THE SEWING CIRCLE







The Sewing Circle is a community program centered in the craft of sewing and community quilting.

Workshops are broken into eight classes, which took place on Sundays from September to December 2024. These workshops are specifically designed for adults, especially those who find it difficult to learn new crafting skills due to limited access in their community, income barriers in class affordability or finding dedicated instructors. There is no fee to participate and supplies are provided for attendees.

Along with gaining basic knowledge of sewing and how to operate a machine, our hope is that participants not only gain a level of comfortability with this crafting skill, but also develop their own artistic voice. The program will end in a culminating exhibition of final projects created by participants, including uniquely handmade quilts.

By exploring the important role that quilting has historically held in Black storytelling and community building, this program presents a "full circle" moment that relates directly to our mission: to celebrate culture, engage creativity and build community for Black Knoxville!

2024 HIGHLIGHTS SIP'N READ AT PETER KERN



In December 2023, the New York Times published an article about the reading parties at Brooklyn bar FourFiveSix and the event's growing popularity across the country. The Bottom launched its own version of a reading party in collaboration with Peter Kern Library (PKL) in August 2024, called Sip N Read.

At our Sip N Reads, participants read a book of their choice for the first hour and then we facilitate an activity for readers to get to know each other for the next hour, all the while enjoying specially curated cocktails from PKL. These new events have been very successful and they have garnered local attention and attracted new people to our bookshop. The Bottom will continue hosting Sip N Read events monthly.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS BOTTOM BOOK CLUB



Literature brings people together. This year, in addition to our monthly book subscription (Book It), The Bottom launched two unique book clubs and a silent reading experience to better connect readers in our community and promote the works of Black authors. The Bottom Book Club tackled 7 books this year across several genres, including:

- Erasure by Percival Everett
- The Black God's Drums by P. Djeli Clark
- Post-Traumatic by Chantal V. Johnson
- Rooted in the Earth by Dianne D. Glave
- Forty Acres by Dwayne Alexander Smith
- Goodbye Earl by Leesa Cross-Smith
- Here for It: Or, How to Save Your Soul in America by R. Eric Thomas

These titles fostered lively discussions, helped to highlight different aspects of the Black experience, and in many ways, allowed participants to delve into the content more deeply by reading in community. The Bottom plans to host Bottom Book Club every other month moving forward.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS BONNAROO: YEAR 2



This summer, we returned to the Bonnaroo Music and Arts Festival in Manchester, TN. Bonnaroo is a four-day celebration of music, arts, and culture, set on a sprawling 700-acre farm. The festival offers an eclectic mix of live performances, visual art, and comedy.

We took over The Rest Stop in Outeroo, where we hosted daily arts activities for festival-goers. We brought along our bookshop, featuring a curated selection of books and merch for everyone to browse and buy. The Rest Stop gave attendees a chance to relax, connect with others and tap into their creativity amidst the excitement of the festival.


One of our highlights was the banned book discussion, which always sparks thought-provoking conversations. We also provided a free community library where attendees could unwind, read, and enjoy the atmosphere. 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2024 HIGHLIGHTS BANNED BOOK CLUB

In response to book bans and attempts of censorship across our state and beyond, The Bottom formed a Banned Book Club to read the books by Black authors that are commonly challenged. Our first meeting was held on September 28, 2024 during National Banned Books Week. During that session, we collectively read the book I Am Ruby Bridges and discussed why Ruby Bridges' story is commonly censored in public schools and libraries. We met again in December to discuss the book The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas, which has been one of the most banned books in the US for several years.


This event was timely because Knox County Schools had just announced a list of 48 titles they are removing from shelves in connection with the controversial Age Appropriate Materials Act in early December. Our efforts were reported in the Knox News Sentinel, which helped to promote our book club to a larger audience. The Banned Book Club will continue to meet quarterly to discuss banned books and build an active community to combat book bans in our state and beyond.
