BEHIND THE BOTTOM

OUR STORY

Founded by Dr. Enkeshi El-Amin, a local sociologist studying race, place, and Black Communities, The Bottom was named after the first Black neighborhood in Knoxville that was demolished by urban renewal and institutionalized racism in the 1950s. El-Amin conducted interviews and archival research and found resounding feelings of displacement and loss of place amongst Knoxville's Black elders and youth. She wanted to do more than just conduct a study, she wanted to make an impact, and thus the idea of The Bottom began to take form.

Dr. El-Amin's efforts joined those of Brandi Augustus, Pumpkin Starr, and Ty Murray of Black Mama's Bail Out, along with Jazmin Witherspoon and other Black women in Knoxville who also sought to do meaningful work. Today, The Bottom stands as a collective working to reclaim and reimagine Black space in Knoxville. What initially started with a youth sewing and entrepreneurial program in 2019, has grown into a hub of Black culture and togetherness. With the support of our community, our space has grown to include a tea room, podcast studio, expanded sewing studio, and bookstore. With the belief that Blackness is neither essentialist nor static, but relational, dynamic and changeable, The Bottom stands as a multi-use place to foster change and provide a sense of Black safety. The Bottom welcomes locals and newcomers to town.



OUR MISSION

The Bottom is a nonprofit cultural organization serving our community through our Black-affirming bookshop and arts space. Rooted in place justice, we stand to build **community**, celebrate **culture**, and engage the **creativity** of Black people in Knoxville. We strive to cultivate a sense of belonging, togetherness and safety for Black people in Knoxville and beyond.

Enkeshi El-Amin is a community sociologist in Atlanta, Georgia. She is currently an Assistant Professor in the Department of Sociology & Anthropology at Agnes Scott College. Her research, exploring the link between race and place, is focused on how racial practices shape Black places and how Black people in turn are involved in practices that define, contest, and reimagine places.

Reflecting on 5 Years with The Bottom's Past & Current Directors





"I don't exaggerate when I say, I am continuously impressed by what comes out of The Bottom, by the work that we do, by the community that we're building, by the beauty that we continue to showcase as representative of black life, past present and future.

The Bottom crew is like no crew I've ever been a part of, the dedication, the commitment, the care that comes through in how our staff do this work is exceptional.

The Bottom was a vision that I had years ago, rooted in love and community and research, rooted in my understanding of how race intersects with place to create struggle but also deep connection. But this is not work that I at any part of this journey have done by myself. This is always and has always been worked in and with community. As we celebrate five years, I am overwhelmed with amazement, with joy, with reverence and remembrance for what The Bottom was, is and will be

I can't believe it some days when I think about how Sew It Sell It got started and how the joy and achievements of those first 15 kids made me want to keep going. We turned 40 books on a folding table into thousands of titles curated on shelves that sometimes don't feel like enough. When we started Black Creatives MeetUp, we didn't know we were building a stage for Tiny Bookshop Concerts. Writing workshops, a literary Magazine, a community Art Gallery, a Ceramic Studio, Our own Building; Those were dreams, too many big ideas, but those ideas nurtured, reestablished and showcased talent held deep deep in our bodies and beautiful minds. I'm not in Knoxville everyday but when I see the pictures, the richness of the shelves, gatherings in the space, my soul sometimes feels transported. I can't wait to see what the next five years will bring.

Today 5 years ago, 70 years ago and 50 years from now, The Bottom lives."

"My time with The Bottom has been a life-giving journey. To not only help plant a seed but to also bear witness to its blooms & blossoms, has been deeply transformational.

In 2020, I came to The Bottom during a season of transition. I was on my way out of Knoxville, headed to Atlanta in search of a larger cultural community and to continue working in the music booking industry. When my career in music booking came to a halt during the pandemic, I found myself laid off and directionless. I realized I wasn't the only one struggling to pivot with COVID19 changes, and I offered my creative services for free to community members in need – that's how I met Enkeshi, our Founding Director.



I had one meeting with Enkeshi, to hear more about her vision and to clarify where she needed support. She shared her research findings, her conviction to make a change, and her hopes of creating somewhere beautiful, welcoming and sustaining for Black communities here. I still had my sights set on Atlanta, but that conversation about the importance of reclamation, ownership, and belonging was all it took for me. I told her to "say less gurl, I'm here, let's do it!" And haven't looked back since.

While navigating many realms of structural marginalization in this country, I've learned that the challenges we face often have less to do with who we are, and more to do with the access we've been denied. That realization has shaped my belief in the importance of cultivating pathways development, visibility, and connection.

It's the power of a dream, a collective vision, and the warmth of a space that can make you want to call a city home. It can inspire you to invest, to push through obstacles, to root yourself somewhere you once felt ready to leave. That's the magic of The Bottom to me. Over the past five years, my roles have evolved along with our organization, but my belief in and commitment to this space have only deepened. With the help of ETHDC, I've purchased a home in East Knoxville to be closer to The Bottom. I've strived to actualize myself as a creative, storyteller, and activist. And I continue working to reimagine everyday possibilities, for myself and for my community.

I'm passionate about spaces where artists can grow personally, professionally and socially. In my own practice, it's never just about what I create, it's also about how I create spaces of empowerment, access, and affirmation. I've found all that and more with The Bottom. To pour so much into a space that also pours back into you is rare. It's been nothing short of a blessing.

"The beginnings of The Bottom, for me, began on Randolph St. A basement level bookshop in a shared office with a room for community events, along with storage for a sewing camp. They were making it work though! I heard there was a space being curated by Black women to address displacement history in Knoxville, along with supporting Black artists. I wanted to help; I wanted to be part of it.

Very shortly afterwards, I began hosting a recurring fundraiser for a bail fund for Black women, in which I named after my grandmother who previously passed. I shared with them how my grandmother use to sell fish sandwiches and how I wanted to fundraise with joy, along with reverence for our ancestors.

They immediately poured into the vision- Ty made a flyer with her elder cooking and Enkeshi connected with a local vendor to provide the fish. Folks showed up, we raised money, we made connections, and I fell in love with what the Bottom was about—having a space for us and by us; for whatever we need for our community. It was the support and the autonomy for me!

After seeing the eventual development of the area looming, we knew we needed to make moves to secure our space and we also wanted to create a launchpad for ourselves as staff. We launched our first campaign to buy the current building and to have paid staff. It was a success and now The Bottom is on Magnolia Ave, secured, and still has staff. This is so much for a Black led community space anywhere but most definitely in a city like Knoxville. I will always feel emboldened by what we did together— I mean, we did some blood-sweat-tears kind of work for a place we loved.

I hope to see The Bottom continue to be a praxis for what folks need in Knoxville and the bravery to seek it in community. I hope it continues to curate culture and connection, like it did for me. I also hope it continues to be sustained and beloved...Black spaces deserve it!

FOREVER BOTTOM CREW"

"When I first joined The Bottom's team, we were in a season of major transition. We had just purchased the house off Magnolia, but the headquarters was still at the old warehouse. My role was to expand The Bottom's bookstore and literary offerings, a job I had never done before. Over the course of four months, Pumpkin, Ty, Enkeshi, and I worked tirelessly to prepare The Bottom for its permanent Grand Opening, a task that required us to think not only about the immediate future, but long-term success as well. A team of just four Black Femmes did the impossible, updated the landscaping, applied fresh wallpaper, wrote grants, stopped leaky toilets, bought books and organized the new space; the preparations were endless.

However, we were never alone. Our community greatly supported our efforts. They, who raised money, painted and dug alongside us, or lent their resources and time in ways too numerous to recount.

As I have returned to The Bottom time and time again following my departure, I am always hit with a wave of emotion for just how much it has grown. I remember when the Podcasting studio was a dream caught up in logistics, or when the first group of Sew It Sell It kids got to use the new space, or the birth of the Ceramics Program! And of course, I would be remiss not to mention the ways that Anastasia has taken the foundations of the bookstore and grown it to include programming such as the Read and Sip at Peter Kern's Library, and the various incredible authors she has brought into the space.

What I loved so much about working at the Bottom was that it had the capacity to lift up everyone around it. Embarking on this new role, I had the faith of the people around me, I found community that I never knew existed, and through The Bottom, I learned and grew and then learned and grew some more. It required so much from me and gave even more in return. I wouldn't have the opportunities that came after if it weren't for the powerful work done here. Four years later, I am a better writer, leader, reader, and community member because of The Bottom.

When I pray for hopes and wishes for the future, I do so in the form of gratitude for the present. I am grateful The Bottom has continued to have funding that allowed them to keep their doors open these past few years. I am grateful that The Bottom remains an unapologetically Black space that supports all community members. I am grateful for the team of people who have continued this work, both veterans and newcomers. I am grateful for their continued health and well-being. I am grateful for the opportunities that have already come and those that are on their way! Congrats on another year of success!

"I can't imagine a time where I didn't love reading. From an early age, reading opened up new worlds for me, helped me imagine new paths, modeled decisions to tough situations, and helped me learn what love was and what it was not. Reading taught me so much about myself, about others, and about the world around me. I found so much comfort between the pages of countless books throughout my childhood and adolescence.

I attribute reading and literature as one of the main driving forces of my life, and one that has led me to The Bottom. As I got older, I realized how important it was to hear storytelling from Black voices. Again, my life was expanded by the words of authors like Toni Morrison, Alice Walker, and more. But over time, life gets in the way of the things that ground us.

The Bottom found me right when I needed it — after graduate school and dealing with a challenging professional situation. I didn't realize how starved of community I was until The Bottom welcomed me with open arms several years ago. I didn't realize how much I needed to retreat back into literature again. And when I walked into the bookshop on Magnolia Ave., it felt like I was turning a page and starting a new chapter of my life as I thumbed across the spines of so many incredible books by Black authors. I had to do my part to keep this vital community space open and available. Now, I can say that The Bottom has been one of the most special gifts, and it's the gift that keeps giving to both its staff and supporters.

As Bookshop Director for the last 3 years, I have been able to build upon the incredible foundation laid by Enkeshi and the rest of the founding Bottom Crew. In that time we have introduced our LitKidz program, started multiple book clubs and our silent Sip N Read event with Peter Kern Library, hosted a wide variety of authors, launched a podcast, continued our monthly book subscription, forged many new community partnerships, developed writers through our Write It Out program, advocated against book banning and censorship across our state, and more. Not only has the bookshop seen amazing growth in my tenure, but I have grown personally as well.

Through The Bottom, I have reconnected with my love of reading. In my role, I have been able to pass along the joy of reading and literature to so many in our community, especially our LitKidz, and uplift the voices of so many Black authors across genres. I have expanded my creative practice, and built a life for myself beyond work and survival. I have developed true friendships with colleagues that I respect and admire, and together we have reimaged what a work environment can be. I am inspired everyday working at The Bottom and I can't wait to see what it will be like 50 years down the road."

"Five years of Community , Culture and Creativity, and we are just getting started! When I joined the team in Summer 2022, I had no idea of the amazing things we would be able to accomplish by now. And honestly, there are so many ideas, projects and dreams yet to be fulfilled within The Bottom.

I came into the team with an idea of how nonprofits operate and how we serve our community, but that was all flipped upside down in the best way possible.

The conversation around Octavia Butler's "Parable of the Sower" was one of my favorites; it brought old and new fans of the work to a shared table where we discussed the parallels between Butler's vision of 2025 in her futuristic book the world we live in today.

After a smaller gathering around Danielle Evans' "The Office of Historical Corrections", I walked away with a deeper appreciation for the social commentary in the short stories as well as connections to new people in my community. Annatasia always pulls poignant reads across broad genres and, through Banned Book Club, we take collective action advocate for unrestricted access to lifechanging literature!







SEW IT SELL IT

A sewing and entrepreneurship program where participants have the opportunity to express their creativity, learn vocational skills and develop a sense of self-reliance by sewing and selling a product.

Through Sew It Sell It, students design a product and conceptualize a micro business around that product.

The program serves children between the ages of 12 and 17. No prior sewing skills are necessary and all equipment and supplies for the program are provided to students.

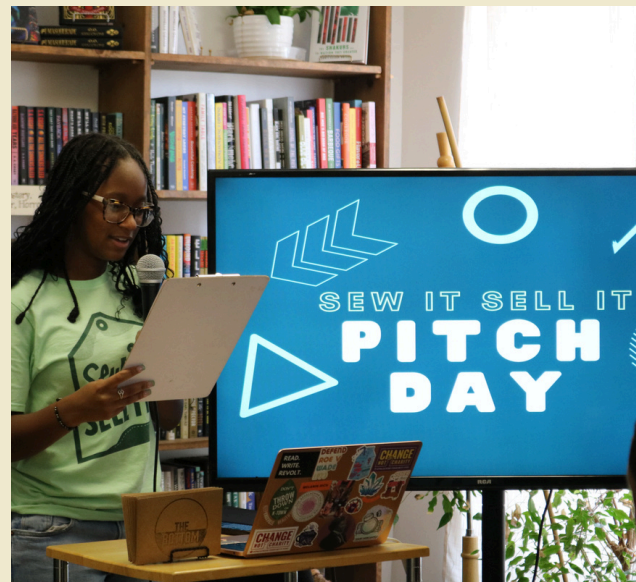
In addition to learning the basics of sewing, through a number of workshops led by business professionals and local entrepreneurs, community leaders and university faculty, students learn business and professional skills from branding and marketing, to giving a good pitch.

This year, our program also expanded its vocational offerings to include workshops on screen printing and pottery!

The goal of Sew It Sell It is to supplement youth in our communities with creative, practical and business management skills that they can continue to use on their own outside of the program.

Our 2025 Sew It Sell It summer program was made possible in part by funding received from the Tennessee Arts Commission and City of Knoxville.

ARTS IN MOVEMENT MEETUPS



Our Arts In Movement initiative, previously names Black Creatives Meetups, is a long-term investment into Black artists and makers in our community.

As a year-round program, we continuously provide instruction, support and a safe space for our creative community to incubate and develop. Arts In Movement (AIM) meetups offer monthly workshops in addition to seasonal events. Each workshop centers an element of development, whether that be artistic, professional and/or social.

Through this initiative, we are listening and responding to creative voices. We asked artists what they need to thrive in our community and it came down to these three key points:

- Welcoming spaces to learn, gather and create
- More opportunities to meet and network with fellow artists
- Workshops, trainings & developmental opportunities

Through offering space, resources, and developmental programming for emerging creatives, as well as supporting established artists and organizations, we invest in a historically underrepresented community, reinforcing our dedication to community investment and engagement in East Knoxville.

BOOK CLUBS AT THE BOTTOM

At The Bottom, books bring people together. Our book club experiences explore Black literature and banned or challenged literature through thoughtful discussion and community building. We have two book clubs: The Bottom Book Club and the Banned Book Club.

LITKIDZ YOUTH PROGRAM



Through the Lit Kidz program, we actively involved our community by empowering youth to make their own book selections in our space. We understand that giving youth the agency to choose literature that resonates with them encourages a deeper engagement with reading and promotes a lifelong interest in representative literature.

Additionally, we contracted local artists and authors to lead themed workshops centered around specific books. These workshops not only enriched our program but also fostered a strong connection between the community and our initiatives. By bringing in local creative professionals, we amplified the messages of the books, spread the joy of reading, and inspired the next generation of creatives.



Within our community and others like ours, limited access to diverse literature in public libraries and schools is extremely common as we encounter systemic book bans nationally. We are bridging the gap within our community, ensuring more children have access to quality, representative books. Children's increased enthusiasm for reading and appreciation for diversity in book selections are notable. Additionally, we remove the financial barrier to accessing literature by keeping our program free. This allows families to feel comfortable coming into our space and selecting any book without worrying about the cost.

CERAMICS AT THE BOTTOM

This project is an ongoing community workshop to develop and transmit ideas regarding ceramic culture and to help foster the next generation of BIPOC Appalachian ceramic craft culture.

These ceramic arts-focused classes are broken into five different sessions where students gather once a week for three hours. Each session is six weeks long and takes place between January and April 2026, there will be a two week break in between each session. Over the course of its duration, this project will provide experiential education the equivalent of an MFA course to a traditionally unsupported community.

The class will provide an exploration of ceramic hand building and will cover the following techniques:

- Pinch Pots
- Coiling and Slab Building
- Hump Molds and Slump Molds

Decorative techniques will include:

- Underglaze
- Slip Trailing
- Sgraffitto
- Inlay
- Monotype Transfers
- Glazing Styles

Classes will be taught by Maggie Connolly and members of the Ceramic Soul Collective.

ARTS IN MOVEMENT EXHIBITIONS



As an extension of Arts in Movement, our bi-monthly exhibitions create space for emerging Black artists and makers to share their work with the community in meaningful and tangible ways. Held six times each year, these showcases are designed to increase visibility, spark conversation, and provide real opportunities for artists to sell their work in a supportive and culturally affirming environment.



Over the past year, exhibitions included All About Love by Ty Murray; Back To Our Roots Group Show; Expanding Horizons by the Ceramics Program; Maame Nsuroma with Ama Swabia and Nina Scott; Patch-Wood Piecing & A Bedtime Story by Jennifer Simon; and Sewing Circle Stories by Sewing Circle Participants.

These exhibitions reflect our continued investment in artists from underrepresented and underserved communities, helping them build confidence, expand their audiences, and strengthen their creative practices while ensuring their work is seen, celebrated, and supported close to home.

THE SEWING CIRCLE



The Sewing Circle is a community program centered in the craft of sewing and community quilting.

Workshops are broken into four 3-hour classes, taking place on Sundays from October to November 2025. These workshops are specifically designed for adults, especially those who find it difficult to learn new crafting skills due to limited access in their community, income barriers in class affordability or finding dedicated instructors.



Along with gaining basic knowledge of sewing and how to operate a machine, our hope is that participants not only gain a level of comfortability with this crafting skill, but also develop their own artistic voice. The program will end in a culminating exhibition of final projects created by participants, including uniquely handmade quilts.

By exploring the important role that quilting has historically held in Black storytelling and community building, this program presents a "full circle" moment that relates directly to our mission: to celebrate culture, engage creativity and build community for East Knoxville!

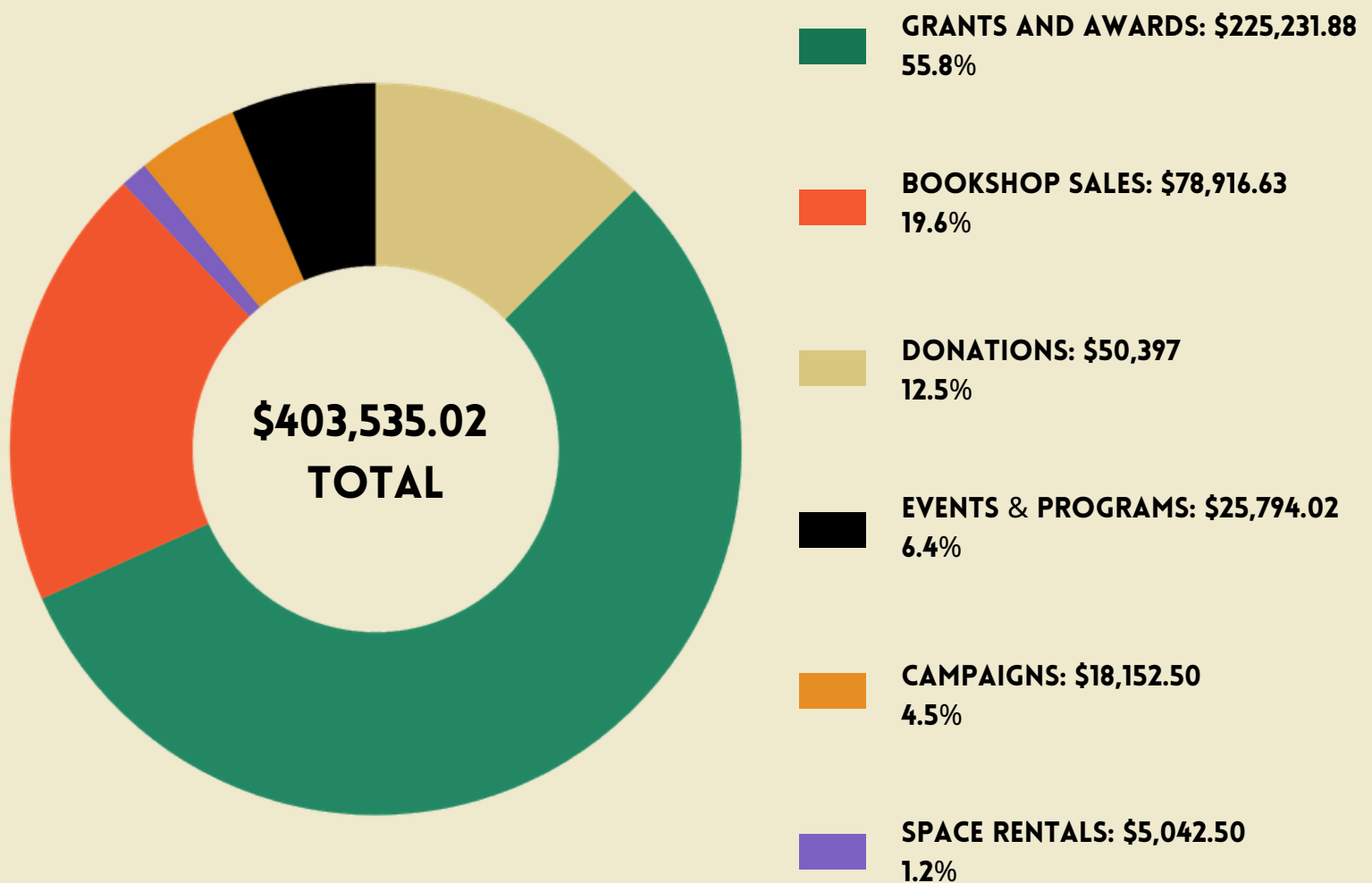
